We are a non-profit organisation that delivers workshops, lessons and assemblies to tackle homophobia in schools.


What is our aim?

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

Sexuality and Gender are a spectrum. You do not have to be 100% anything and it's ok if your identity changes!



3 in 5 pupils who experience homophobic bullying says it impacts on their school work

96% of lesbian, gay and bisexual pupils hear homophobic remarks such as 'poof' or 'lezza', and 99% hear phrases such as 'you're so gay' or 'that's so gay'





First of all: **don't use it!**If you hear homophobic, biphobic or transphobic language, challenge it yourself.

Ask a question:

'Why are you saying that?'
'Do you understand what you're saying is hurtful?'
'You do know that's homophobic don't you?'

People may turn around and say 'I didn't mean it in a homophobic way'. This is your chance to explain that even if they didn't mean to be homophobic it is still not ok to say these things!
