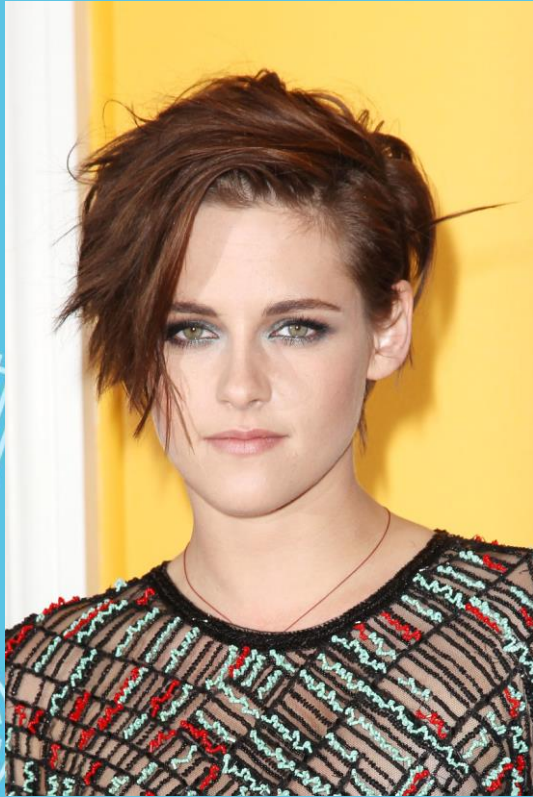

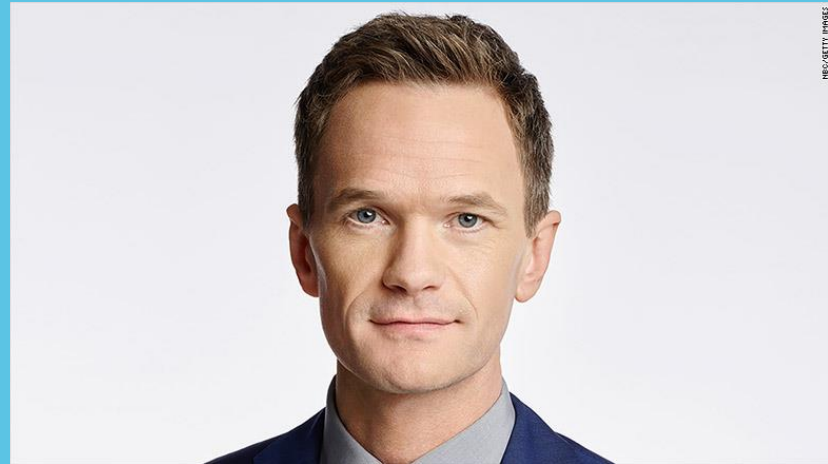

Sexuality is a spectrum

Sexuality is not just 'straight' or just 'gay'.

People can fall anywhere on the spectrum
(gay/straight/bisexual etc).

There doesn't always have to be a label for your sexuality.

Your sexuality can be fluid, and it can change and that is ok!

Gender vs Sexuality

Gender does not have to match what you were assigned at birth e.g. male or female, and it can be something else (e.g. non binary)

Sexuality-who you are attracted to. Can be one gender, many genders or none at all.

Sexuality and Gender are a spectrum. You do not have to be 100% anything and it's ok if your identity changes!

What is homophobic language? What does it mean?

9 in 10 secondary school pupils have heard 'that's so gay'

92% of secondary school pupils have heard 'that's so gay' and felt isolated and lonely. (Stonewall, the school report, 2012)

3 in 5 pupils who experience homophobic bullying says it impacts on their school work

96% of lesbian, gay and bisexual pupils hear homophobic remarks such as 'poof' or 'lezza', and 99% hear phrases such as 'you're so gay' or 'that's so gay'

How we and you can challenge this language

First of all: **don't use it!**

If you hear homophobic, biphobic or transphobic language, challenge it yourself.

Ask a question:

'Why are you saying that?'

'Do you understand what you're saying is hurtful?'

'You do know that's homophobic don't you?'

People may turn around and say 'I didn't mean it in a homophobic way'. This is your chance to explain that even if they didn't mean to be homophobic it is still not ok to say these things!
